INTRODUCTION TO PHILOSOPHY

Philosophy 100: Spring 2011. First assignment. Due Date, Friday March 4th.

Write at least five pages answering **one** of the following questions:

- 1. Why does Socrates think 'Philosophy' is worth dying for? What exactly is he dying for?
- 2. Explain as fully as possible the meaning and importance of Socrates' claim that he knows nothing, and knows he knows nothing.
- 3. Socrates has a very distinctive view of what matters in life. Explain and evaluate this view.
- 4. Are Socrates' views on death consistent throughout the Apology?
- 5. Explain why, according to his final argument (p.17-18), Socrates thinks that death is not a bad thing. Assess the argument, and consider whether such a view gives rise to any wider problems. (For example: can Socrates still think murder is wrong?)
- 6. Is Socrates at all times true to his "I know nothing" claim?
- 7. Does Euthyphro have a *better* understanding of holiness after talking to Socrates, and if so in what sense?
- X is holy (and right) because it is loved by the gods or The gods love X because X is holy (and right). Explain the difference between these two options, and consider possible problems that might arise with each, and how you might resolve them.
- 9. Do we *still* (i.e., in 2011) face any problems equivalent to those discussed in the *Euthyphro*? (You should answer this question from the point of view of someone who believes that standards of right and wrong *should* derive, in some sense, from God.)
- 10. "A mouse is basically just like a watch." What follows from this?
- 11. Explain and critique Locke's "Mind First" argument.
